The thousand and one probabilities for the Spanish failure



We complete our Eurovision 2021 chronicle by focusing on the results in Spain. How likely was it to reap such a bad streak? It could be worst? In addition, we updated our results simulator with those obtained in Rotterdam.

SPAIN, A HISTORY OF INDIFFERENCE

In our previous blog, *Zitti e zero punti* we dedicated some brushstrokes to the results of 2021. In the current one, we are going to focus a little more on Spain. I hope you are having a nice day.

If instead of a scoreboard we arrange the points obtained in the Eurovision final on a bar graph, we see a deep sinking in the final zone. Four of the directly classified countries, including Spain, are in this depression. The step between the Netherlands and San Marino is not only remarkable, 39 points, but there is no higher one until the jump between sixth and seventh.




If we break down the positions of Spain this year we have been much better with the juries than with the televoting. And not so much for the 6 points, but for the frequency of positions in each one.

In the following graph, the most frequent position in the juries was both 19th and 21st, while in televoting it appears shot at 24th (second-to-last for finalist countries, third to last for non-


finalist countries). In addition, the frequency of televoting is higher in the last 5 positions, from 22nd to 26th.

At the other extreme, our best position on the jury was Bulgaria's 7th, while 12th is far behind and out of the points we received from the Portuguese televoting.




In the following image you can see the frequency of the jurors, but this time individually. We were not the best song for any of the juries this year. Our two best ratings, a second and a third, are from Bulgaria.

The highest frequency accumulates again in the 19th and 21st positions. The decay in the twentieth position at least indicates that our song was not so rejected, but that we fell into the zone of indifference. Because it could be done worse ...



Below are the same data but comparing them with those of 2017, when Manel Navarro did not obtain a single point from the 41 national juries. In this case, for the 2017 data, there is an upward trend in the final zone, which does reflect rejection, intention to put ourselves in the worst positions.



In summary, this year the jury has left us in the zone of indifference, without being totally rejected. However, the televoting has placed us in that critical area that shows that our issue did not stand out at all. Anyway...

1 BETWEEN 1,001

Since 2015 and until this year, at the moment, Spain is on track only places below number 20. As an absolute figure, it is quite tragic, but what probability was there to chain such a bad streak?

It is very difficult, and especially highly variable from year to year, to calculate the probability of being in a specific position. However, through the aforementioned probability calculation we can obtain some data that serve as a guide.

For example, if being in 2014 we assume that each position is equally likely, the probabilities of having a record as bad or worse as Spain's were 1 in 152,761. In other words, it was easier for us to win the Lotería Nacional.

In the case of Spain, it is difficult to assume that all positions are really equal to obtain, due to the obstacles that we all suffer. Therefore, we suppose that for Spain to be from the twentieth to the bottom has a probability around 50%. Since it is easier to be twentieth, the odds become 1 in 1,001.


Although in this case we suppose that it is so probable for Spain to be below or above 20th place, the probability that only one year (of the six) we will be above was practically 100%. We are not even talking about making a top-10 or finishing in the first half: it was impossible to think that we could reach this streak.

If it is any consolation for anyone, in these same cases, the probability of having a record equal to or worse than Germany is 1 in 13,067. Up to 13 times worse than the Spanish and one year they were fourth. Looking ahead to next year, the odds of Spain chaining 7 years in a row with this streak is 1 in 2,354. Can we get out of the hole?

ESCVERSE 4.1 THE CALCULATOR IS UPDATED

The wait until the next festival will be long. As usual, we update our ESCverso results calculator to version 4.1. With this renewal we have added the results of this 2021, both the final and the semi-finals.

The spreadsheet presents these features:

Event: The simulator will allow you to play with the last three editions of the festival, that is, the finals and semifinals of 2021, 2019 and 2018.

Voting rules: You can find out what would have happened to the results if the voting rules from previous years had been used.

Point system: If you think that other ways to distribute points should be explored, this is your section. Not only are different and varied systems available, but you can also create your own personalized one.

Which countries vote?: If you want to measure the impact of the countries that vote in the final but do not perform, try this filter available for the three finals.

Televote, jury or both: With this menu, available when you select the current mechanic, you can break down the votes by the decision of the audience and the experts. Remember that if you combine "televoting only" and "only the finalists vote" you will see the results as it was done until 2003.

Type of juries: In 2018 a new calculation was established for the classifications of juries. If you select the linear method you will see the (approximate) results of how they were calculated up to and including 2017.

Here are some of the interesting results that can be obtained from playing with the calculator:

In the first case, we have presented the results as they would have been done in 2003 and previous years, only with televoting and voting for the finalist countries. Italy would have continued to win and France would be second. This year in the televoting Ukraine was the silver medal, but, after discounting the non-finalist countries, it loses this position with Voilà. Norway would be the country that rises the most, while Malta would settle for a 16th place.

As for the first semifinal, we have calculated the points if the jurors were linear (in 2018 their calculation as mere averages was complicated by adding exponentials). With this change, the pass to the final would have been very tight, with 3 countries in just 2 points.



No matter how much you play with the results of the second semifinal, the positions within it vary very little. However, under the 2009-2012 standards (average of televoting and jury scores, not ranking) Georgia would have been ranked last with zero points. Denmark, in any case, always far from the classification.



So far our analysis on Spain and the results of the 2021 festival. We are closing this season, but for the next there will be many more new topics to investigate and many others that we will continue to develop. We are not leaving completely either, in summer, as usual, we will publish a serialized special about one of the most characteristic aspects of the festival.
